A Fixer-Upper

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
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Lives You Have Enriched Little Buddies received a plea for help from a shelter in West Virginia when a four-month-old kitten with a limp was dropped off 30 minutes prior to closing. The kitten had been attacked by a dog and was obviously in a lot of pain. They urgently needed a rescue to help, or they would have to euthanize him. They did not have the ability to get him the vet care he needed, nor space for him to be quarantined. We stepped up immediately by having a transporter pick him up and take him straight to the vet for examination and X-rays.

This poor kitty was covered in fleas, had a fever, and was diagnosed with a severely broken shoulder. Thankfully we were able to schedule surgery just a few days later and keep him comfortable on pain medication in the meantime.

The vet who initially examined him told us of a friend who is also a vet, Dr. Skinner, who was interested in fostering and potentially adopt-

ing him. We quickly got her approved as a foster and were happy to have the expertise of a vet caring for him as he recovered. Dr. Skinner named him Tip because he has a cute white tip on the end of his tail.

Taloo

Taloo and his two brothers were found by a good Samaritan who feeds and trap-neuter-releases (TNRs) strays near her home in rural Pennsylvania. Taloo and his siblings began visiting her back porch to eat the food she had left out which allowed her the opportunity to trap them. They were a bit skittish, but did accept some petting, so she reached out to the rescue community for foster and adoption support.

Little Buddies offered assistance and took Taloo and his siblings into foster care. Taloo's brothers were quickly adopted, but Taloo was

a very nervous kitty who was sporting a limp. His foster took him to the vet where an X-ray revealed a non-healing hip fracture. The vet explained that this was an old injury causing him extreme pain with every step.

Taloo was referred to a veterinary specialist who surgically removed his fractured femoral head which is the spherical-shaped part of the bone that attaches the leg to the hip. Removing this eliminated his "bone on bone" source of pain.

His surgery was successful, and he needed to be confined for a couple of weeks and monitored closely. He was exercised in a confined space daily to ensure he had a chance to heal and was bearing weight appropriately.

At his six-week follow-up ap-

pointment, x-rays showed that he had healed very well. He now moves like a normal kitten who runs, climbs, and jumps.

Dr. Skinner could not part ways with Tip and decided to adopt him. She says that he is a talkative kitty who adores the company of people. He watches birds from the window and even animal shows on TV. His favorite toy is a purple gift ribbon that he loves to drag around the house. We are thrilled to have been able to save both his life and his leg!

Taloo required careful rehab for eight weeks. He was a trooper during confinement the first two weeks after surgery, receiving regular pain meds and range of motion exercises.

Over the next six weeks his activity gradually increased.

His muscles now provide support for his leg and scar tissue has created a false hip joint that allows pain-free movement.

We knew Taloo had a successful outcome the day he climbed to the top of his cat tree! He has fully recovered and shows off his agility by chasing cat toys and running all over the house. Taloo is available for adoption and ready to find his forever home where he can have his favorite evening snuggles and laptime.
